Activities


- Bouncy castle and obstacle course: 1:00 pm − 5:00 pm

BEWARE: Creeping bellflower (Noxious Weed)

This perennial was introduced from Europe as an ornamental and reproduces both by seed and creeping rhizomes. Roots can travel under fences, through lawns and even under side-walks and concrete. It can survive periods of drought and tolerates a range of light conditions. Its creeping root system and resistance to some herbicides makes Creeping bellflower extremely difficult to eradicate. Flowers are pollinated by insects, but in the absence of pollinators flowers can become self-fertile still produce seed. Native harebells can be confused with creeping bellflower as the flowers are quite similar, but the native plants can be distinguished by either much shorter stems, small -er flowers and leaf size & shape.

Creeping bellflower can be an aggressive invader in natural plant communities. It can survive droughts and survive in a wide range of light conditions. This plant's thick creeping roots can travel under fences, lawns and concrete, making it very difficult to control. This plant is also resistant to many chemicals.

The flowers are purple, blue or sometimes white, bell-shaped, and nodding. Each plant has numerous flowers that are arranged on one side of the stem. The heart shaped leaves are 2-5 cm wide, have toothed edges, and are alternately arranged along the stem. See picture on next page.

The plant grows up to 100 cm tall and has a creeping root (rhizome) which gives this plant its name. Plants reproduce by seeds and by the rhizomes and can re-generate from very small root pieces in the soil. How do you control this weed? What to do? Mechanical: Hand-pulling or cutting and bagging flower spikes pre-bloom can be an option for preventing seed production. How-ever,



UPDATE! Health care projects in Community

CapitalCare Norwood Redevelopment Project: Construction activities began over the summer after the permanent road closure of 105 Street (north of McDonald's and south of 112 Ave). Fencing went up around the construction area, which includes a parking lot used by Norwood staff, and ex-

tends west to 106 St. Norwood staff are now parking at Kingsway Mall. You may have noticed increased foot traffic and less vehicular traffic in the area as a result of these closures. Excavation and piling activity is well underway and will continue throughout the fall and winter. The relocation of the underground electrical transmission line is underway.

CAMH (Child and Adolescent Addiction and Mental Health) Project: Alberta Health Services and the Government of Alberta will be holding an open house for the community this fall to discuss a new project to be built on the Royal Alexandra Hospital campus. It will be one of the largest centres of excellence in Canada offering child and adolescent mental health services. Planning is underway. We will share details once they have been confirmed.

the plant will re-sprout from its creep-ing root system. Digging out the as much of the roots system as possible can be successful, but will require several years' effort.








PLEASE MARK THESE DATES & REMINDERS ON YOUR CALENDARS:
